2009 CRITICAL PATH CURATED PROGRAM

LEA ANDERSON (UK)

TWO WEEK LABORATORY: FAST WORK (FOUR NSW ARTISTS) 16-27 MAR

This laboratory will explore methods of devising and developing new work by confronting the issues of inertia and the lack of spontaneity of choreography. It will also address the problem of the limiting nature of habit formation in decision-making in the creative process. The lab will focus on spontaneous reaction from visual stimuli in response to a set of instructions. It is envisaged that this will transform the material into a physical form over a very limited time scale. This laboratory is for artists who are interested in developing fast decision processes in order to make work that they could not have made in any other way.

is a one-week laboratory that aims to explore alternative relationships between architecture, perception and the human body in the thinking, making and construction of space. The laboratory will examine how space is perceived and recorded so as to 'action' and 'interact' with various design methodologies towards conceiving and designing space at the FraserStreet Studio Gallery. The week will use the concept of the 'living city' as a stating point, acknowledging it as an entire interconnected entity developed by experimental groups such as Archigram, Superstudio and Archizoom and more recently OMA and Dillier Scofidio. This will aid the laboratory in constructing divergent models.

This workshop will be facilitated by Dr Benedict Anderson, Course Director, Spatial Design, Faculty of Creative and Cultural Industries, Spatial Design, University of Hertfordshire, UK.

INDIGENOUS CHOREOGRAPHIC LABORATORY

23 SEP-2 OCT
CO PRODUCED AND PRESENTED BY

Critical Path will partner with Marrugeku to produce a laboratory for 12 choreographers and performers who devise work from around Australia and New Zealand. The laboratory will be led by Serge Aimé Coulibaly from Burkina Faso in West Africa and Charles Koroneho from New Zealand. These two international dance theatre makers will present their distinct approaches to devising contemporary performance from their indigenous traditions. Artists will be encouraged to work from their own individual interpretation of being an













indigenous artist. Forums will be conducted on working with traditional and contemporary material and approaches to dramaturgy. This will be the first in a series of laboratories lead by different choreographer/directors over the next three years.

This laboratory explores individual and communal memory through physical movement, sound, visual and other media. Rosemary and Cathy will work with a group of artists who have a variety of skills and experience who are interested in exploring the making of installation work using composed sound, dance movement, film, photography or other media.

The laboratory will take a place, event or a collection as its starting focus. The participants will use this focus for both the collection, generation and structuring of material and as an aid to unlock their own memories and reactions.

In the first two weeks there will be a strong emphasis on the research process and the exchange of ideas through physical and philosophical dialogue. Participants will focus on the ability to sustain movement memory, record the physical and engage in dialogue with other participants.

In the second two weeks, the laboratory will relocate to Campbelltown Arts Centre. There will be a public sharing of research material. See calendar for details.

Running parallel to this laboratory will be *What I Think About When I Think About Dancing* a project for nationally and internationally commissioned artists to explore the shifting parameters of contemporary dance and visual practice through live work, residencies, performances and showings.

Xavier will conduct an intensive 5-day laboratory for five choreographers which will research methodologies of choreographic practices. The laboratory will focus on questions arising from the participants' work. The proposal starts with an exchange formed through the questions each choreographer is currently engaged with. For example Xavier proposes to expose some specific methodologies and procedures that he uses in relation to a couple of his works. The laboratory would be about a critical analysis of methodologies and procedures in through participants' respective choreographic practices with the aim of specifying them and inventing new ones for future works.

SODA EXCHANGE (SOLO/DANCE/ AUTHORSHIP)

SUPPORTED BY THE GOETHE-INSTITUT APPLICATIONS DUE 1 JUNE

Critical Path and the Universität de Künste Berlin are offering an Australian solo dancemaker a 4-6 week residency in Berlin between October and November 2009. The successful artist will be provided with working facilities. They will be hosted and assisted in building professional networks in Berlin and Germany. In keeping with Critical Path's goal of offering extended pathways locally, nationally and internationally, we regard the SODA program as a great opportunity for an Australian solo artist to develop their practice.

The Master of Arts-SODA is an innovative, 2-year Master's degree by performance making and research. It combines intensive and immersive laboratories and workshops led by established artists, with seminars, showcases and symposia. Workshop and laboratory facilitators come from a range of art disciplines including dance, performance art, new-media arts or creative writing.

The program explores different ways of making performance. It aims to 'make art', and to enable students to understand and reflect on the making processes involved. Its primary objectives are combining production with the development of an individual online 'artist workbook', which reflects on, articulates and evaluates working practices, issues in process documentation and modes of analysis of process and outcome.

Cyrille Nérovique has been the Research Room artist-in-residence during March and April. At the conclusion of his residency he will present a performance installation exploring collective memory and the repercussions this has on the body.

Cyrille was born in France and lives in Montpellier. While in Paris he worked with choreographers such as Jean François Duroure. He has also worked with Groupe Ergot/ Karl Paquemar, Young Ho Nam and has choreographed a solo, *Le Biscuit Sans Farine*, with musical collaborator Fredrich Wallich for the festival, Anti Déchet Nucléaire. He has created a multimedia performance, *Savoureuse Cuisine*, in collaboration with Virginie Masson for the multimedia festival, Interference, in Belfort, France.

PERFORMANCE SPACE RESIDENCY OCT

In October Critical Path links up with a new strand of the Performance Space residency program. Performance Space will invite choreographers to create new works in a series of residencies with Critical Path also providing space and support. Performance Space is exploring the role of residencies in the commissioning of new work and the interface with audiences at early stages of creative development. The residencies will overlap over four months – July to October–to facilitate linkages and shared knowledge. This initiative will culminate in a weekend of informal discussion at Performance Space about the works-in-progress and the development of a sustainable practice.

MAINTAINING THE TRAINING

16-20 NOV

Choreographers Narelle Benjamin and David Clarkson will curate sessions focused on the on-going question 'how do we maintain and sustain our bodies through a physical regime? Or not?' Through a combination of teaching and participating in classes, the week provides an opportunity for dialogue and a sharing of practices and different disciplines. The week will focus on exchanging skills relating to physical practice. Ten sessions will be 'exchanged'. Participants will be able to commit to at least four sessions in the week and will be offered the opportunity to lead one session. These sessions will allow the opportunity for dialogue on physical practice and offers participants a chance to discuss ideas and challenges around maintaining a practice in NSW.

SCHOLARS AND ARTISTS IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM AT THE NATIONAL FILM AND SOUND ARCHIVE

2 NOV-18 DEC

In accordance with Critical Path's frame on histories and archiving, we have partnered with the Scholars and Artists in Residence Program at the National Film and Sound Archive.

Liz: "I am delighted to have been offered a Fellowship at the National Film and Sound Archive. My placement follows on from research I have undertaken over the past eight years into the early modern dance artists who have been inspired by classical Indian dance, namely Ruth St Denis and Anna Pavlova. I am now looking into the role they played within Australian dance development.

"As an Australian performer and choreographer I am based between London and Sydney, specialising in the field of contemporary and classical Indian dance. I have been working with Jacobs Pillow Dance Festival and the New York Public Library during this time and have re-interpreted three of St Denis's 1906 solos. Last year I traveled to India following the routes of the 1923 Anna Pavlova company tour and the 1927 Denishawn tour, filming a documentary."

Liz is currently Associate Director at QL2, Centre for Youth Dance, Canberra.
